The Wisdom Thinkers Vision

What we offer:

Ralph Singh, founder of The Wisdom Thinkers Network, will customize a day long visit for your school context. In order to challenge and engage students at a variety of ages and stages, the day can be structured as several workshops, class visits, and assemblies designed for a particular age range of students.

PROGRAMS

Lower School

PK-grade 3: Storytelling and role-play from Ralph Singh's book and character education program, Stories to Light our Way. This book combines tales and fables around the world to help foster children's intercultural understanding of kindness and inclusivity.

Grades 4-6: The workshop at this level will use Stories to Light Our Way as the foundation for the presentation, but, along with hearing the tales, intermediate students will collaborate to create stories of their own. These stories may take many forms: written narrative, dramatic presentation, visual art, or shared as oral traditions of their own (to be captured as podcasts or videos).

Middle School

Grades 7-8: Assembly or workshop format. Older students will be encouraged to make the transition from a general understanding of personal values to their application in a broader global sense.

Upper School:

Interactive sessions in assembly or smaller groups – and “master” story telling workshops teaching students the Power of weaving stories into public speaking and writing, helping them find their own voice.

He uses discussion, case studies, and role play to engage students in identifying opportunities and realistic action plans for societal change.

Sharing their personal journeys creates an instant sense of community in which it becomes easier to address the difficult questions which may divide us. He is known for his creative ways of framing issues to allow all voices to be heard and respected.

He likes to be known as an ordinary person who has enjoyed (and continues to enjoy) extraordinary life experiences: from the powerful vision that drew him from New York to the feet of one of the world's greatest spiritual masters, His Holiness Baba Virsa Singh, in India, where, at the age of 22, he became Babaji's first foreign devotee, to his involvement in the community building efforts surrounding the post 9-11 arson attack on his spiritual community Gobind Sadan, USA, North of Syracuse, NY.

Ralph has authored and edited five books, including "A Path to Follow, A Life to Lead" about his life's journey. As a former National Council Member and Chapter President of UNA-USA, Ralph helped establish the Central New York MUN at Syracuse University, which now draws over 500 students from the U.S. and Canada. Committed to justice and community building, he chaired the local Human Rights Commission, coordinated an award-winning program to break down barriers between the able-bodied and disabled communities, and developed programs for drug awareness and poverty alleviation.

He speaks regularly on diverse subjects related to spirituality and civil society, maintains a Huffington Post blog in addition to his own Exploring Spirituality blog, and contributes commentary and articles regularly to local media outlets.
